STORIES FROM THE CORPS

After a 30-year career with the New Orleans Police Department, including significant work in the special victims' unit, Joe Lorenzo retired in 2023. Seeking meaningful engagement post-retirement, he joined the Ignatian Volunteer Corps (IVC) and was placed with the Society of St. Vincent de Paul New Orleans. In this role, Joe utilizes his extensive interview skills to assist community members in need, addressing issues such as housing, food, and clothing. His empathetic approach and ability to anticipate clients' needs have been invaluable, with Executive Director Michael Bourg noting that Joe's background enables him to connect deeply with the individuals they serve.

As part of IVC San Diego's Center City Schools Initiative, 16 Service Corps Members are stepping into roles such as tutors, instructional aides, librarians, and assistants in art, music, and athletics at four inner-city K-8 Catholic schools: St. Rita's, St. Patrick's, Our Lady's School, and St. Katharine Drexel Academy. Among them, Veronica O'Neill fulfills her childhood dream of teaching by revitalizing the library at St. Rita's School, aiming to instill a love of reading in students. She reflects, "I joined IVC because it aligns with my spiritual values that 'God is in everything.' To be able to bring those values to St. Rita's School is so rewarding." Lynda Kelly, a retired executive, reengaged her professional skills through the Ignatian Volunteer Corps (IVC) by supporting Catholic Charities Wyoming (CCWyo) in strategic board governance and executive coaching. Initially working remotely, she conducted board member interviews and assessments, presenting her findings virtually. In July 2024, Lynda attended the board retreat in Wyoming, deepening her connection with CCWyo's mission and the communities they serve. This experience not only allowed her to contribute meaningfully in retirement but also enriched her spiritual journey, as she reflected, "I even managed to catch a Wyoming rainbow reminding me spiritual growth is ongoing and provides infinite possibilities for opening ourselves up to the unknown in this wild wonderful world."

In 2024, IVC continued to grow its reach and deepen its impact. With over 550 members serving in more than 300 nonprofit organizations across 30 states, IVC provided critical support to communities in need. From mentoring students to assisting at food banks, IVC corps members dedicated over 20,000 hours of skilled service this year. Their collective efforts saved nonprofit partners an estimated \$12.5 million in salary costs—resources that could instead be channeled toward vital programs and services.

This measurable impact reflects the power of IVC's mission to inspire retired adults to put their time and talents toward building a more just and equitable society.



Reflection from Fr. Jim Conroy, SJ

Carrying the Legacy Forward: Faith in Action Thirty years ago, when Fr. Charlie Costello, SJ, and I co-founded the Ignatian Volunteer Corps, we were inspired by a simple but profound truth: retirement is not an end but a beginning. 
Imagine IVC Strategic Plan Overview






